



Key Facts about Organ and Tissue Donation

- There is a critical shortage of organs in this country. More than 106,000 individuals currently await a lifesaving transplant in the United States. Of those, more than 9,000 are Texans.
- Last year alone, more than 6,300 people died awaiting an organ transplant; that's 18 people who die daily because an organ did not become available to them.
- A person is added to the national organ transplant waiting list in the United States every 11 minutes.
- The generosity of an individual donor can save up to eight lives through organ donation and enhance another 50 through tissue donation.
- In 2009, more than 28,462 organ transplants were performed in the United States. Organs used for transplant include kidneys, heart, lungs, liver, pancreas and small bowels.
- Close to one million tissue transplants are performed annually. Tissue includes skin, bone, heart valves, veins and corneas. Skin is used to treat burn patients and individuals with cancer; bone can be used to treat orthopedic injuries and cancer patients; corneas can enhance and restore sight.
- The Glenda Dawson Donate Life – Texas Registry is the official state organ, tissue and eye donor registry. Signing the registry is a legally-binding, first-person consent to be an organ and tissue donor upon a person's death.
